Meningitis and Septicaemia awareness

Twelve of our staff are currently in the process of completing their Emergency Paediatric First Aid Course. This is in addition to the six trained First Aiders we already have on site. The training provider (GEM Compliance Training) supplied our school with information cards to raise awareness of Meningitis and Septicaemia and the common signs and symptoms in each case.
